"Open Wide!": Dr. Ammon Davenport

Our speaker will be Paul Marino, the Program Director of the Northern Berkshire Community Television Corporation. He lives in North Adams where he is a local historian, a tour guide, and a photographer.



Paul Marino will speak about **Dr. Ammon Davenport** (1827-1911) who grew up at Meadow Place on Catamount Hill and attended the log schoolhouse there. He followed two brothers to New York where they all took up the fast-developing science of dentistry. In Paul Marino's presentation, "Open Wide!", we will learn

about the practice Dr. Davenport established in North Adams, the mansion he acquired, business buildings he built, as well as aspects of his family life.

The Historic Site on Catamount Hill

It is with great pleasure that the Catamount Hill Association recently accepted a gift of land on Catamount from the Mary Lyon Foundation. The land, originally intended to be given to the Catamount Hill Association, has been held in trust for the Association until they received official 501(c)(3) non-profit status from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

For generations this historically significant property was in the Davenport family. It was part of Paul Davenport's 300-acre farm which was deeded to him in 1793 and is the site where Paul and Amasa Shippee raised the first American flag over a schoolhouse in May of 1812. Tom Davenport, great-great grandson of Paul, deeded the land to the Mary Lyon Foundation in 1997.



The stone monument and stately flagpole commemorate the 1812 protest of the unlawful impressment of American seamen by the British Royal Navy. The forcible seizure of American men in the late 18th century was the catalyst for the War of 1812.

In an article from the Greenfield Gazette and Courier dated November 28, 1903, reference is made to the two-acre parcel of land on Catamount owned by Freeman L. Davenport which he retained when he sold his last pasture and timber lot to the Marcey and Donelson Lumber Company. It was his intent that the land ultimately belong to the Catamount Hill Association which was established in 1875 as a place-based organization to forever unify the original Catamount Hill settlers and their families.

A Violin Mystery

Old newspaper accounts reveal that music was often included in Quinquennial Reunions -- human voice, fife and drum, brass band, and violin. In 1900, Maud Purrington (1872-1915) performed several selections on an organ which must have been transported to the meeting place near the dens by horse and wagon.

The 13th Quinquennial Reunion at Hillside Park in 1935 had 250 attendees. The *North Adams Transcript* reported: "Following a basket lunch at noon there was music by the Shippee orchestra of six pieces and selections by Harry P. Shippee of Ashfield, a noted old-time fiddler and a descendant of the Shippee family of Catamount hill fame."

Descendants of Paul Davenport (1766-1832), the flag-raiser of 1812, have a strong sense of history and for generations have preserved diaries, letters, documents, and artifacts. When Paul's great-great-granddaughter, Florence Davenport Reynolds (1919-2006), sold her Aunt Louise's home in Shelburne Falls, the old violin pictured here with its decorated case was noticed among the contents by the realtor, Patrick Shippee.



After the house sold, Mrs. Reynolds gave the violin to Mr. Shippee, but she could not explain its presence among other items of Catamount history. Could this be the fiddle played not only at Catamount Quinquennials, but at concerts and dances all around New England?

When Harry Shippee (1861-1938) died, the *Transcript* reported "ASHFIELD FIDDLER LEAVES ALL TO SON". This wasn't quite true -- a bracelet and a watch were left to a granddaughter, but no mention was made of his violin. What happened to it is still a mystery. Could it be that his violin and this one are the same instrument? The research continues...
