John Anson Dwight's Rainy Day Stories

Samuel Maxam came to Catamount Hill in 1809. He built a foundry on the old Dwight homestead and operated it nearly twenty years before converting it to a distillery. When Spiritualism became popular in the 1870's he built what was called Maxam's Temple.

Joseph Riley Farnsworth, born on Catamount Hill in 1840, was a wounded Civil War veteran. While returning home from a medical appointment necessary to collect his benefits, two Catamount Hill ruffians beat him and robbed him of the \$3 in his pocket. The two men received life in prison because Joseph died of his injuries. He left a wife and two small children.

In 1812 when Artemas Churchill built a house at the north end of the pond, he and the community called it Beaver Meadow. Later, when Dr. Nat Davenport took ownership, he blasted away the last of the beaver dam.

At some undocumented date, Sam Brown operated a sawmill at the south end, taking advantage of the water flowing through the stone flume.

Earl McLeod purchased the land in 1942. When the area was acquired by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts in 1966, the name "McLeod Pond" was retained.

Morris Pierce was a lifelong Catamount Hill resident. He won many awards for his Merino sheep, horses, and cattle.

Tom's Beloved Catamount

Few knew or loved Catamount more than Tom ("Monsai") Maloney. Aside from growing up on the southern-most extremity of the mountain, it was Tom's playground from the time he could ambulate.

Starting with bicycles and advancing to an old VW Beetle, to snowmobiles and to dirt bikes, Tom traversed nearly every inch of his beloved mountain. From the lake and its lakehouse, to Mill's Camp and the ominous caves, to the spot of the country's one room school house where the first flag flew over a house of education, Tom knew Catamount's haunts like the "back of-his-hand."

In Tom's absence I will always hitch Tom and Catamount to the same wagon in my thoughts and remember him flogging either a snowmobile or a dirt bike past me and looking back over his shoulder with a bovine residue-eating grin on his mischievous face. And if he could splatter me with mud from his rear tire, his glee would increase exponentially! In later years when Tom wasn't riding trails himself, he could be found repairing and otherwise maintaining them for others to use and to enjoy. In this regard he was a true steward of the mountain that gave him so much pleasure in his own lifetime. You'll be missed, Tom, by so many who shared your mountain over the years.
