Annual Town Meeting—June 16th

On a beautiful June evening, 58 Colrainers attended this year's Annual Town Meeting and approved the entire warrant.

Voters approved a town operating budget for fiscal year 2022 of \$1.75 million, a 2.9 percent increase over the current budget, and \$2.16 million for the Mohawk Trail Regional School District's budget.

replacement of the fire alarm control. A town vote will be held within the next 90 days to decide whether monies borrowed will be exempt from Proposition 2½.

After some discussion and using a hand count, voters passed “A Resolution in Opposition to State Subsidies and Incentives for Biomass Plants,” which opposes state subsidies and incentives for wood-burning biomass plants and states they are harmful for the environment. Leverett, Montague and Springfield have passed similar resolutions.

Voters also approved a second citizen’s petition requiring the use of the gender-neutral term “Selectboard” in town bylaws, rather than “Board of Selectmen.”

Lower Electricity Costs for Colrain Residents

Its easy to get back in and realize cost savings

Last summer the Town of Colrain joined with 12 other Franklin county towns in the purchase of electricity at a reduced rate in a program called “Community Choice Aggregation”.

The Eversource winter rates have just been approved by the Department of Public Utilities (DPU): they are about 1.5 cents higher per kWh than the price Colrain residents who opted into Community Choice are paying.

years, so the cost difference over three years adds up to about \$281 (this can't be accurately predicted because Eversource bids their electric prices every 6 months and the consumer price varies accordingly).

The Town power supply contract includes an option for 100% wind power at a cost increase of only one tenth cent per kWh. Over three years that is an increase of only \$19 for completely green power and probably less than the Eversource price.

When this Town program was first introduced some customers didn't understand the program and opted out of the program. Luckily it is easy to get back in and realize cost savings. To opt-in just go to the website colonialpowergroup.com click on "our towns", go to "Colrain", click on "opt in/out" and fill out the form with your changes.

Our provider is now working with the State to find solar developers which will work with the 13 town aggregation to provide the benefits of low cost solar power to low income consumers.




